

playground Protocol

At Heamoor School we are very fortunate to enjoy wonderful parental support and engagement. We appreciate the very positive relationships that we enjoy with our parents which were re-affirmed at our recent Spring Parental Consultation meetings. We also value how friendly and supportive parents are of each other. These positive relationships are at the heart of our school community.

We understand that from time to time issues will occur that can upset parents & this may affect the way they would normally relate with other parents. If the issue is a child-related matter and is a one-off, low-level incident, we are aware that parents will often attempt to resolve the matter informally & amicably between themselves. While we are always glad to hear when this approach works, we also advise parents that sometimes it will prove counter-productive and only end up inflaming the situation further.

Where the issue relates to problematic friendships or relationships, where pupils' and parents' versions of events can be both emotive and subjective, the school always advises parents to approach the school first and to engage with staff in resolving the problem as calmly and as objectively as possible. We do not recommend that parents approach each other, especially if they are not in full possession of all the facts. More importantly we do not allow parents to approach any child directly and speak to them about any issue or concern. We understand that some parents may feel that it might be helpful to have a polite and friendly word with one of their child's friends or class mates but many of our parents do not share the same view and would consider such an approach by an adult as deliberately intimidating. Parents must always bear in mind that children, and other parents, may not interpret what you say or do in the way that it was intended.

We would like to remind all parents that the school must always be a place where pupils, parents and staff feel safe and welcome. Where parents have school-based concerns, we ask that they engage with the school as promptly as possible as we are always happy to assist. Where parents may have out-of-school issues, they must ensure that they are never brought into the playground or the classroom.

At a recent Governing Body meeting, governors were concerned by a number of incidences recently where parents did not comply with these expectations and as a result children, parents and staff either witnessed or were exposed to unacceptable levels of parental conflict and aggression within the school.

Such behaviour is never acceptable & the Governing Body is aware that it has who have a duty of care to protect all staff, pupils and parents. Governors would like to remind parents that they have the right to invoke action if

they feel the school is experiencing anti-social, abusive, aggressive or threatening behaviour, either directly or indirectly This includes the governors' right to request parents to attend a meeting to explain their actions & their commitment to the school. This protocol also extends to potentially defamatory comments being made about the school in general and/or individuals (even if unnamed) on social media.

Changes to swimming arrangements

After reviewing our provision for swimming throughout the school, we would like to take this opportunity to inform you of some changes which will commence this half-term.

As we live in a county surrounded on all sides by water, we feel that it is vitally important for our children to learn to swim. In an ideal world we would want all our children swimming every week however organisational & timetable pressures make this impossible. We have therefore decided to focus our resources and time on key groups within the school.



From Spring 2 onwards, we will be providing our Reception Class with a weekly swimming session which will enable them to learn to swim from as early an age as possible and which will then support them in pursuing their interest in swimming through other avenues *e.g.* swimming at Penzance Leisure Centre, swimming club, surfing, sailing etc.

In the Summer term, as well as the weekly Reception session, we will also be providing "top-up" lessons to any of our Y5/6 pupils who have not yet achieved the expected end-of-Year 6 National Curriculum standard of being able to swim 25 metres.

<u>Please note:</u> Green Class will also have a weekly swimming session for this half-term.
