Remembrance Day Art

Red Class have been taking part in our whole school project, studying the art of Jaqueline Hurley, an artist who focuses on remembrance.

Everyone worked really hard to practice mixing white and black to make different shades of grey as well as adding flour and sand to our paint to add texture. We discussed how the paint felt and which was our favourite and why.

They then cut out their silhouettes and added them to their backgrounds and added poppies, using their preferred textures.

The finished paintings look great and are in display in class.
