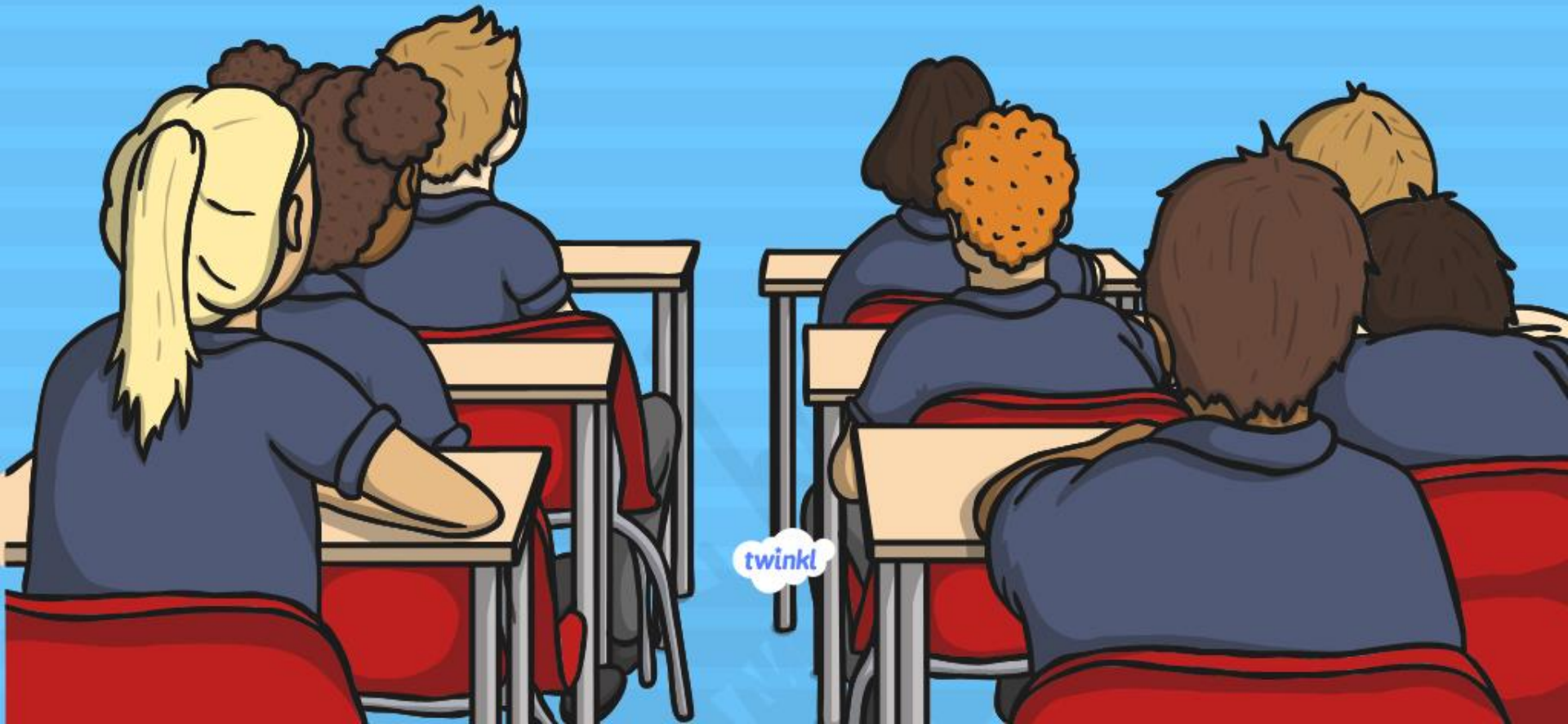


# There, Their and They're Homophones



# Homophones

These words all the sound the same, but they are spelt differently, and have different meanings.

**there**

**their**

**they're**



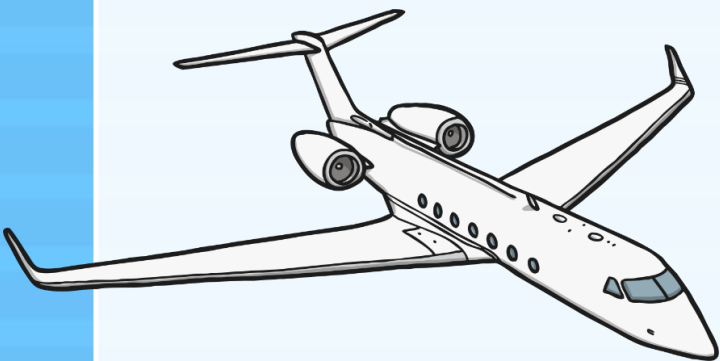
# there

'**there**' refers to a place or position.

The children are playing over there.



There is an aeroplane in the sky.



Top tip to help you remember this one:  
*'There' has 'here' in it, so is talking about a place/position.*

# their

'**their**' is a possessive adjective. This means it shows ownership or belonging.



Their lunch was very tasty.



These children are wearing their school uniform.

Top tip to help you remember this one:  
*Think of the 'I' in 'their' -  
belonging to  
someone/something.*

# they're

'they're' is a contraction. This means it is a shorter way of saying 'they are'.

Top tip to help you remember this one: Try putting 'they are' in to the sentence. If it still makes sense, it's 'they're', but if it doesn't it must be either 'there' or 'their' instead.

They're playing a game together.



They're running around the track.



# there, their and they're

They're all talking to their friends over there.
