



# Red Class Home Learning Grid –WC 4th January 2021

Read It	Write It	Design/paint/draw It/ Make It	Count it	Independent Me
Our class story for our first topic during lockdown will be 'The Gingerbread Man'. If you have the story at home, read it to someone in your house by using the illustrations to prompt you. What colour hair, eyes and skin do you have? If writing your name is still tricky, practice this every day!	Design a house similar to the one that the little old lady lives in, but this time it will be for the Gingerbread Man to live in. Think about where he would sleep, eat, wash and spend time with his family.	Make yourself some numeral cards 0–10 using paper and pens. Can you order your numbers from smallest to biggest then biggest to smallest.	Getting dressed and undressed on your own can be difficult. Choose one item of clothing each week to practice putting on and taking off yourself.  This could be shoes, laces, zips or buttons.
Choose a book from your house and ask someone at home to read it to you. Can you tell them what the author and the illustrator do, where you can find the title and can you guess what might happen at different points in the story.	Choose 3 animals from the story, 'The Gingerbread Man' and draw them. Write 3 adjectives to describe each character. Remember to use the sound mat on the website to help you.	Using your design, use rubbish and recycling in your house to build your house for the Gingerbread Man.	Using a part-part whole machine, take 5 peas from the freezer (or something small from home) and look at all of the different ways you can make 5.	Help out at home by making your breakfast with an adult daily. Remember to wash your hands first, and ask for help from an adult.
Read somewhere in your house where you wouldn't usually read, be as creative as possible.	Make some sound cards at home, using the A3 sound sheet in your book bag. Decorate them using different colour pens, glitter and sequins. Ask your family to 'flashcard' them to you like we do in our phonics lessons. I wonder how many you can remember.	Make a thank you card to send to Santa for a Christmas present that you received.  Remember to write your name at the bottom so he knows that it's from you.	Write all of the number bonds to 5, after you have built them on the part=part whole machine.  Example $2+3 = 5$ .	Think about one thing that you find tricky. This might be counting to 10, writing your name, opening a bag of crisps, brushing your teeth. Practice that one target every day and see how much better you become after working on your target.
