



## Home Learning Grid Blue Class - 2

Read/Research it	Write it	Paint/Draw it	Build/Create it	Do it
Read one of the free e-books from myONEbooks (the link is on the Heamoor Website).	Write a diary: write about the things which you get up to each day (including what you eat).	Draw a line drawing, without lifting the pencil.	Make a scrap book to help you look back at this time that you spent at home.	Do a taste test with someone in your family. Take it in turns being blindfolded and trying the different foods. Describe how the food tastes and feels in your mouth.
Research different ways to say hello around the world.	With the help of an adult, write a food menu for the week and try to stick to it.	Illustrate different dishes from the weekly food menu that you write with an adult.	Use an empty egg carton to create something such as flowers, fairies, dinosaurs or trees.	Tell the story of one of your favourite television shows and illustrate it.
Research and create your family tree.	Before starting a new book, look at the cover only and write three lists: I see, I think, I wonder. Then after reading the blurb, make 3 more lists: I know, I think, I wonder.	Design and draw a new hairstyle for anyone in your house.	Create a sun catcher—things which you could use are sticky-back plastic, coloured tissue paper, coloured feathers and crayons.	Make lunch with a family member—if it's sunny and you have a garden, make it into a picnic.
Learn how to do one of the housework tasks that an adult in your home normally does, and then offer to do it.	Write a fictional story. You could turn yourself into a fictional character and write about a child who is currently at home, or write about a Superhero travelling the world. You decide.	With your family members: you have 10 minutes to each sketch a family member, keep rotating until you've drawn everyone.	Build your own musical instrument—think about using beads, sand or rice to help make the sound.	Grow some plants or vegetables using seeds. If you don't have any seeds use your vegetable scraps (an avocado pit in water, basil stems in water, the celery base in water, mushroom stalks in soil).
Research the birthdays of your family members and make a birthday calendar (drawing each family member next to their birthday).	Write a traditional story from a different point of view. E.g. Write <i>Cinderella</i> from the point of view of one of the ugly sisters. Or write <i>Goldilocks and the Three Bears</i> from the point of view of Goldilocks.	Draw a board game—use Snakes and Ladders as inspiration. You could make counters out of Lego, or just use shells/pebbles/coins.	Use any empty boxes (cereal boxes etc.) to create an obstacle course for a mouse.	Teach someone in your house (adult or child) something that they don't know but you do. E.g. phonics/ how to dance/ the Roman Numeral song.
