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
Welcome Back

This term our learning takes a strong historical focus and you will see the children's knowledge and skills building as they progress through the school. Our youngest children in Red Class will be following the same theme, looking at toys old and new.

We continue to need your support with keeping all children safe in our community, this includes dropping off and collection times. Please do your bit to support all of the children arriving and leaving safely to school. This is everyone's responsibility.



- Shut both car parks at 8:30am so that the only traffic entering the school site is for the drop off point.
- Have a member of staff at the drop off point each morning to welcome your child.
- Only allow blue badge holders to park in the disabled bays.
- Politely ask parents to park elsewhere when on school grounds.



You Can!

- Drop off your children using the 'drop off point'
- Walk to school where possible or park a little further away.
- Avoid double yellow lines and parking opposite the school entrance.
- Do not reverse into the school entrance, use the one way system provided.
- Keep to the speed limit of 5 miles per hour.

Be polite to staff, they are trying to keep your children safe.



After this, we discussed what makes a fair test and measured the water level after each hour throughout the day.









We have also been exploring poetry in Blue Class. Again, we have enjoyed being active in our learning by clapping syllables, creating actions to support our recall and playing a game of charades. Our focus poem is called 'The Magic Box,' and we individually placed items that we would like to put in our own magic box in one of our classroom boxes. After this, we worked in teams and had to guess what someone from another team was acting out.

We are very lucky in Blue Class as a coach from Penzance Tennis Club will be leading our PE lessons over this half term. We all thoroughly enjoyed our first lesson and impressed Mrs Flores and Mr McGarry with our attitude and willing to keep on trying even if we were struggling. We particularly enjoyed 'The Space Invader' game at the beginning of the session.
















The children in Indigo Class have made a fabulous start to the new term Here are just a few things to give you a flavour of what they have been getting up to . . .

Community Cupboard


Please remember that the community cupboard is open and there are lots of items available. Pop in anytime, or phone the school office if you would like a bag of items made up for you.
