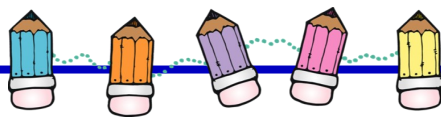


# EYFS BIG BUILD!

# Curriculum Focus - Writing

## Curriculum Intent

Our writing curriculum intent is to immerse the children in quality texts and equip them to communicate and express themselves creatively and imaginatively.

## Writing Within Our Curriculum

We plan writing opportunities around the rest of our curriculum in order to make writing meaningful and to give the children a real context and an 'authentic audience' for their own writing. Texts and stories used in writing lessons are chosen either because there is a link to the class project or due to the high quality language and creativity within them. Being exposed to texts of such good quality enables children to 'magpie' ideas to use in their own compositions.



## Talk for Writing

"Story plots act as blueprints for the imagination."

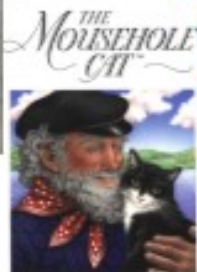

Our 'Talk for Writing' approach allows children to fully immerse themselves in a fiction or non-fiction text. This strategy enables children to learn fiction through storytelling and non-fiction by 'talking the text', using story or text maps and actions. Once they are familiar with the text, they then begin the process of writing their own versions (innovation) and finally composing pieces of writing using more of their own imaginative ideas (invention).

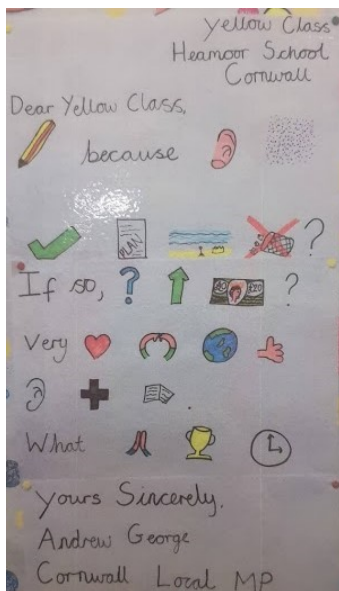




# Writing at Heamoor

Children in Year 2 & Year 5 'talking the text' and using actions to help them learn.

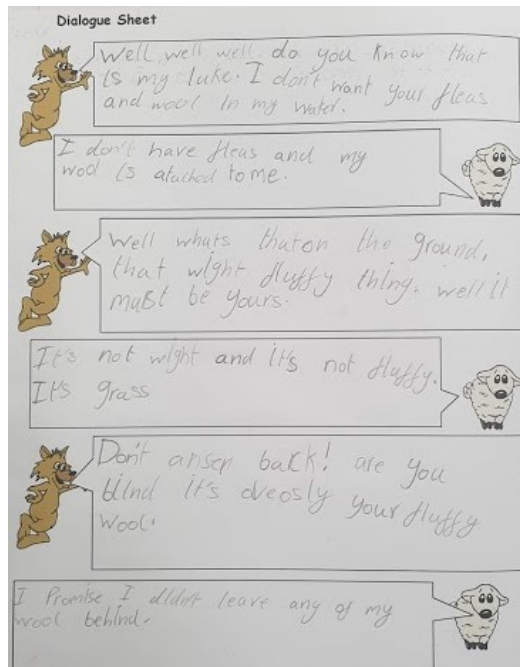
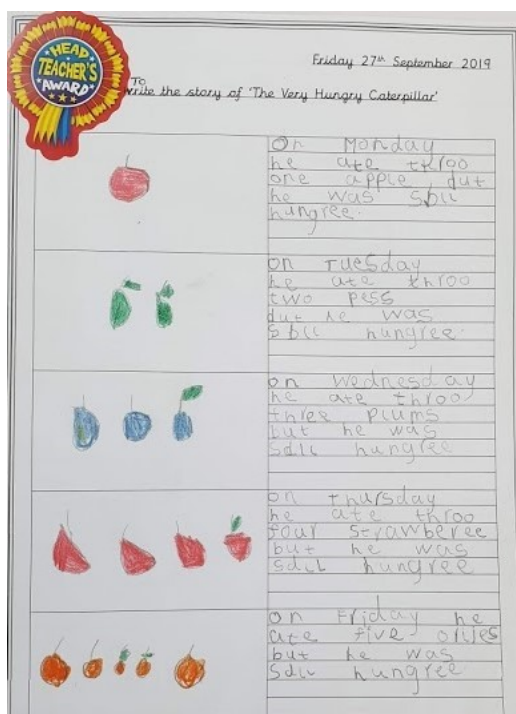




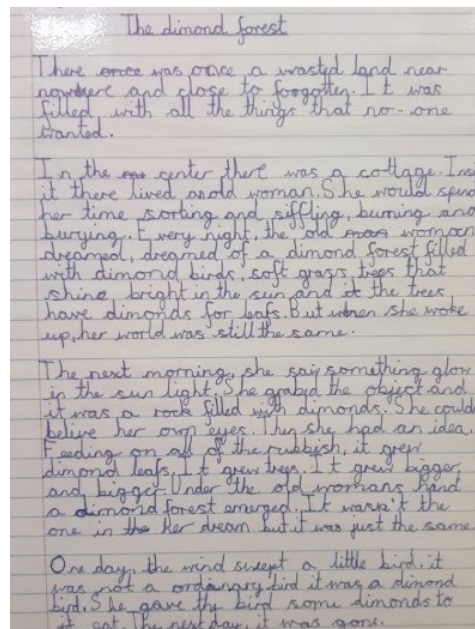
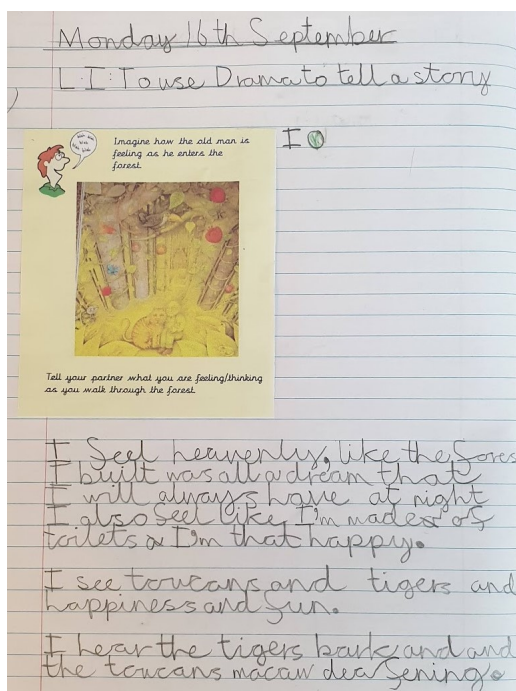
# Writing at Heamoor

## Writing for a range of purposes

Children use writing in a range of different ways. They explore feelings, thoughts and emotions; describe characters and settings for stories; discuss and plan their own ideas; experiment with new and exciting vocabulary; discover their own imagination.
