Write an acrostic poem about CAPTIVITY (so the first letter of each line should spell the word captivity if read downwards). You might want to use it to compare the lives of zoo animals with your own experiences of lockdown.	Sketch plants or trees the next time you are out walking. Alternatively, take photos and sketch them when you get back home.	Design and build the perfect habitat for your favourite woodland animal. You may need to gather natural resources when you're out and about.	Can you identify plants and trees from the shapes of their leaves or the fruit/flowers that they produce. If not, use something to identify them e.g. an app that will identify them from a photo.

Write a persuasive text, such as a promotional leaflet, encouraging people to visit this new find. Remember to use powerful descriptions to make it sound as impressive as possible.	Create a <i>prehistoric</i> piece of art. This could be a 'cave painting' using pastels and charcoal on tea stained paper to give an authentic appearance.	Recreate a prehistoric site or monument like Stonehenge. You could even get inspiration from Neolithic remains from right here, in Cornwall.	Visit an ancient monument or prehistoric site e.g. Men-an-Tol, Lanyon Quoit, Carn Euny, Merry Maidens stone circle.
Read two more books from 'myON' (find the link on the Heamoor School website).	The tennis championships in Wimbledon should have been happening during this week but could not go ahead this year. Create a poster, advertising the Wimbledon championships 2021.	There have been a number of different logos for the Wimbledon championships over the years. Design a new one for 2021. Think carefully about the colours you use - Wimbledon takes tradition very seriously!	British tennis player, Andy Murray, now has his own brand of clothing (<i>Castore</i>). Design your own tennis outfit including shoes, shorts/skirt/dress, t-shirt and cap/headband.	Find 5 facts about the Wimbledon championships from its 143 year history that you did not know before.
