## Blue Class

We have had a busy couple of weeks in Blue Class. After a very successful Harvest Festival concert, we made poppies for Remembrance Day. We began our Autumn 2 term project, The Bronze Age. We learnt about and drew our own timelines for the Stone, Bronze and Iron Ages. While looking at The Ages timeline, we learnt about the Bell Beaker culture and the bell beakers drinking vessel. We have designed and started making our own out of clay.





## Indigo Class



In their History lessons this week, Indigo Class have been learning all about Iron Age farming. They have discovered what life was like for a farmer and how important a job it was.

They have looked in detail at the kinds of tools that Iron Age farmers used and how they used them.

On Wednesday they created pieces of artwork using collage, depicting different farming tools - the ard, sickle and rotary quern.




















#### Violet Class

Violet Class have LOVED learning about the Iron Age in our new project. We have looked at the most common profession at the time—farming—and what tools the Celts used to help them. We have also been considering how a historian finds out information and discussing sources—both primary and secondary. The children have been thinking critically and evaluating the benefits and potential problems with both types of sources and interpreting sources for themselves. We have learned of the importance of religion to Iron Age people and written an invitation inviting someone special to a Celtic festival! Well done, Violet Class!
